

# 3 Milwaukeeans Killed In State Auto Crashes

Three young Milwaukeeans were fatally injured Monday morning in two separate automobile accidents outside of Milwaukee County.

Dead were:

Gordon F. Barbaras and his wife, Mary, both 28, of 2480 W. Medford Av.

David Fennig, 23, of 2401 S. 57th St.

The Barbaras couple was killed about 6 a. m. when their car hit a concrete culvert as Barbaras drove through a heavy fog near Angelica, in Shawano County. The couple was en route to Rhinelander when the accident occurred on County Trunk C, a detour for Highways 47 and 55. Authorities said there was no evidence that the car was traveling at a high rate of speed.

Fennig died Monday afternoon, m. when his auto collided with a truck at the junction of Highway 73 and 51, two miles west of Plainfield in Waushara County. Two persons in the truck were injured. All were taken to a Stevens Point hospital where Fennig died Monday afternoon.

Injured were William R. Patchen, 28, of rural Albany, Wis., and his wife, Augusta, 31, Waushara County Traffic Officer Dan Chase said the Ross truck went through the red flashing stop sign at the intersection. Patchen and his wife suffered minor cuts.

Fennig was returning to Wisconsin Rapids where he had been employed since June with the Wisconsin Highway Department. He was born in Milwaukee and attended Boys' Trade and Technical High School. He graduated as a civil engineer from Marquette University in June. He

served in the Navy for two and one half years in World War II. He was a member of the Triangle engineering fraternity at Marquette University.

Surviving are his parents, Roman and Olympia Fennig, 2401 S. 57th St.; three brothers, Capt. Maurice, with the Air Force at Truax Field, Madison, and Daniel and Thomas, Milwaukee, and one sister, Carol. Funeral services will be handled by the Fennig Chapel, 525 W. Lincoln Av.

Barbaras, an internal revenue agent with the Wausau office, was an Air Force lieutenant in World War II, flying a bomber over Europe. He was graduated from Marquette business school in 1950. He and his wife, and two children, Dianne, 3, and Nancy, 23 months, have been living with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Barbaras at the W. Medford Av. address. He also is survived by a brother, Glen, of Wilmington, Del.

Mrs. Barbaras, the former Mary Duszynski, is survived by two brothers, Frank Dorsan and Al Duszynski, of Milwaukee; four sisters, Mrs. Florence Kendall of Terre Haute, Ind., Mrs. Lucille Hamann, Mrs. Leona Bashaw and Miss Ann Duszynski, all of Milwaukee.
